The girls tell us they had a ball.
























The 4th annual staff v tenants match took place at the Birkenhead Boys club amid heavy and persistent downpours, but this did nothing to

he has purchased a DVD player and is donating it to the Children's ward in Arrowe Park Hospital for the poorly children to watch Christmas movies.



Recycling and reducing plastic waste is becoming so important to the World around us.

What can we do to help?

Eco Bricks

An Eco brick is a reusable building block created by packing clean and dry used plastic into a plastic bottle to a set density. Eco bricks enable us to take personal responsibility for our plastic, and can be used to make stools and tables for the garden, raised beds for the garden etc.

Making an EcoBrick

1. Choose a clean, dry bottle

We recommend starting with a simple-shaped bottle as it won't have any tricky areas (which if left un-stuffed leave week air gaps). It must be clean and dry because any organic matter left in the bottle may decay, which could make the brick unstable and compromise the integrity of the build, likewise for your filter plastics.

2. Collect your filter materials.
Any clean, dry, unrecyclable plastics can go in. Use soft plastics at the bottom as they will fill any uneven surfaces and prevent air gaps, it is wise to cut up harder plastics into smaller pieces so you wan't be left with gaps (and they fit through the opening). Please do not put metal, glass, paper or biodegradable/compostable plastics in your bottle, or any organic materials.

3. Grab a <u>Altok</u> and <u>Altort Altuffing!</u>
We reccomend squashing the plastic down as you go with your stick (wooden spaon handle, broom handle, etc.) as it's much easier than doing so once the bottle is full. Mix hard and soft plastic as you go to avoid air gaps. Try squeezing your bottle; you shouldn't be able to if it's packed tight enough!

4. Weigh your bottle

b, the minimum density should be about 0.3a/ml. Divide the ml of your bottle by 3 to find your target weight. If you haven't reached it, squash mo plastic in! Then look for a building project in your area to donate it to.







Waste Not Want Not is a zero Waste Shop situated in the Country produce section of Birkenhead Market. Providing dried food, beauty/ skincare and household cleaning products which are plastic free so you take your own containers, bottles or bags or they operate bottle

return/refill options. Other items are available such

as bamboo toothbrushes, bamboo/ metal straws and glass jars for refilling.







Other things we can do are:

- 1 Only consume what you need. Always ask the question do I need this? Especially when food shopping
- 2 Only replace older items or appliances, when they are no longer able to perform the role they were intended to do
- 3 Reuse as much as possible, for example reuse old carrier bags either for shopping or as bin liners.
- 4 If you can no longer make use of something that someone else might be able to make use of, offer it for sale or donate it, via an online auction site or Freecycle.
- 5 Recycle everything that can be recycled in your area, find out what services are on offer in your area and make use of them. Visit Recycle Now's website to locate your local services.
- 6 When recycling, ensure that you place only acceptable materials in the containers.









Make a mini photo album




1. Cut out seven rectangles of card, double the size you want your album to be (these will be the pages) and two rectangles of card the size of your album for the cover.








- 3. Fold each of the larger rectangles in half.
- 4. Begin building the page by gluing the smaller page to the centre edge of the largest page.







6. Next place a line of on one of the outside edges and stick the second page edge to the first.








8. Grab your four cover pieces. Place glue all over the cardstock cover piece then stick the decorative cover on top. Do this for both cover pieces. This image shows the bottom and top covers.

9. Cut two 10" pieces of ribbon. Glue the ribbon to the centre of the cover pieces as shown.



10. Place glue all over the cover then attach it to the front of your album

11. Place glue all over the remaining cover and attach that to the back piece, again making sure the ribbons are together so they can tie.

12. you can now decorate the pages of your album with treasured photographs, stickers, or inspirational quotes





13. If you open the album and bring the covers together your book will look like a star! You can leave it on a table or hang it from the ribbon!

Back in September, we had a visit from our friends at CQC. CQC stands for Care Quality Commission, and they check organisations like S2I to see that they are providing good health and social care to the people who use it.

They visited some of the properties and spoke to some of the people we support, their families and other professionals about the service we provide.
